## Course Objectives

In this course participants will examine a range of strategies for effective school-family and community partnerships. Participants will examine studies regarding how to create a school community that empowers parents, family members, and community partners who play an active role in young children's lives to support their educational success. By sharing this responsibility with families and the broader community, the school promotes a reflective learning culture based on trust where school leaders model an inclusive and reciprocal relationship with members of all segments of the community. At the end of the course, participants will become familiar with research-based findings on the value of, strategies for, and impacts of family and community engagement as they relate to young children's development. Also, explore a variety of methods for generating two-way communication that authentically engages families and communities as equal partners; and apply an asset-based approach to building collaborative relationships between the school and families and between the school and communities.
